MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE NAPLES CITY COUNCIL HELD IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS, NAPLES, FLORIDA, ON FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 7, 1980, AT 5:01 P.M.

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m. and explained the procedure to be used for the Public Hearing. He also explained the proposed City budget and proposed millage rate.

AGENDA ITEM 1. PUBLIC HEARING

AGENDA ITEM 1-a. Consideration of adoption of a tentative millage rate for 1980.

Mayor Anderson opened the Public Hearing at 5:05 p.m. There being no one to speak for or against, the Mayor closed the Public Hearing at 5:06 p.m. Paul Hartley and Ralph Kessler asked that the Mayor explain the millage rate which he did.

AGENDA ITEM 1-b. Consideration of adoption of a tentative budget for the fiscal year 1980-81.

Mayor Anderson opened the Public Hearing at 5:10 p.m. Helen Radke, Ralph Kessler, Marvin Bell and John Anson Smith noted that an overview of the proposed budget should have been available for their perusal. Herb Cambridge asked that the next meeting to approve the budget begin between 7:00 and 7:30 p.m. and he also asked that money be placed in the budget to hire two school crossing guards for the area around the post office on Goodlette Road. Mayor Anderson responded that this was the first he had heard of a problem in that area, but that the matter would be checked into. Reverend Richard Rohrer requested that extension of First Avenue South from 7th Street to 6th Street be placed in the budget. He also noted that a petition had been submitted to Council endorsing this in August with several hundred signatures. He read several letters covering a span of two to three years in support of opening the street. Charles Bowen, representing 36 residents of Park Terrace Condominium at Central Avenue and 7th Street, spoke in opposition to this project. Paul Muenzer, representing Central Naples Association, presented a petition with 40 names (Attachment #1) opposed to the street. He also noted for the record a letter sent to Council prior to the meeting (Attachment #2). John Branden, president of the Gulfview Middle School P.T.O., spoke in opposition. Viola Stewart, C. D. Shaw, citizens; Connie Mackey representing a handicapped program and citizen Ed Shelton spoke in support of opening the street with Mr. Shelton offering to loan the money needed. Citizens Al Waller and Joe Van Ornum spoke in opposition to the project. Citizen John Smith suggested that the City follow the planned schedule which proposed doing the street at a later date. Further discussion of providing an overview of the budget followed and it was the consensus of Council to have this available at the final Public Hearing on the budget and that this information would be published in the newspaper. There being no

one else to speak for or against, the Mayor closed the Public Hearing at 7:00 p.m. *** *** Let the record show that Mr. Wood left the Council table at 7:03 p.m. ***

AGENDA ITEM 2. A resolution adopting a tentative millage rate for 1980; and providing an effective date.

City Attorney Rynders read the above titled resolution by title for Councils' consideration. Mr. Holland moved adoption of Resolution 3652, seconded by Mr. Thornton and carried on roll call vote, 5-0 with Mr. Wood being absent from the Council table.

AGENDA ITEM 3. A resolution adopting a tentative budget for the fiscal year 1980-81; and providing an effective date.

City Attorney Rynders read the above caption resolution by title for consideration by Council. Mr. Holland moved adoption of Resolution 3653, seconded by Mr. Thornton and carried on roll call vote, 6-0.

AGENDA ITEM 4. Set date for Public Hearing for final adoption of budget and levy.

After discussion, Mr. Holland moved that the final Public Hearing be set for Monday, November 24, 1980 at 7:30 p.m., seconded by Mr. Rothchild and carried on roll call vote, 6-0. It was the consensus of the Council members that overview sheets would be available for the public at that meeting.

There being no further business to come before this Special Meeting of the Naples City Council, Mayor Anderson adjourned the meeting at 7:15 p.m.

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We would like this letter to be placed on file:

This letter is in response to the proposed completion of First Avenue South between Sixth and Seventh Streets. We have noted strong neighborhood reaction <u>against</u> this proposal for the following reasons:

1. Taxpaying residents are opposed to it as a waste of money that could be used on more important projects. It is unnecessary considering the fact that Central Avenue and Third Avenue South are parallel to First Avenue and are both designed to carry more traffic. Another through street is not needed in this area.

2. It would cause a tremendous increase in traffic on a narrow residential street. People would begin to use it as a through street from Goodlette Road to Gulfshore Boulevard.

3. Children playing on the athletic fields at Gulfview Middle School would be greatly endangered by the traffic right next to them. 4. The Methodist Church contends that it needs this opening to accomodate "newcomers" and "visitors". We maintain that the churches location on Third Street is very accessible as it is only one block from Central Avenue and two blocks from Gilfshore Boulevard. It is difficult for the Residents in that area to accept the churches argument when on Sunday the church parking lots overflow onto neighboring lawns.

We conclude that the <u>Residents</u> of the First Avenue South area should be considered first. We are the taxpaying citizens who must live on or near the street everyday.

We also feel that the best way to use this land would te to vacate it and donate portions to be used by Gulfview Midile School, the Public Library, and a Mini-Park as outlined in the City Master Plan.

· Please keep us advised on this matter as we are extremely interested in any decisions being made pertaining to it.
