SUBJECT: Proposed Amendments to Non-Bargaining Unit Pay Plan

September 2, 1983 DATE:

BACKGROUND

Periodically, the Personnel Division reviews the City's Pay Plans for accuracy and equity. The Division also responds to requests for review from department heads. Salaries are reviewed for comparability within City employment and with private industry. The Personnel Division also reviews pay plans with the objective of maintaining effective procedures and practices. The purpose of this memo is to recommend changes in the Non-Bargaining Unit Pay Plan to correct a salary inequity and a personnel procedure that is inaccurate.

ANALYSIS

In relation to other classifications in similar pay grades, the Parkways and Service Superintendent classification, Terry Fedelem incumbent, is not properly compensated at Pay Plan III, Pay Grade 3. The major decisions required of this classification provide enough responsibility for a higher level of compensation. The Parkways and Service Superintendent classification is required to supervise thirty-three (33) positions involved in a variety of technical, skilled and unskilled duties and responsibilities. Public contact, consisting of answering complaints and regularly attending homeowner's associations meetings, is also required. Comparison with other classifications with similar responsibility reveals the need for reassignment of pay grade to Pay Plan III, Pay Grade 5.

Under the current Non-Bargaining Unit Pay Plan, the merit increases granted effective October 1 are based on performance evaluations completed using October 1 to September 30 as rating period. Obviously, this provided insufficient time for proper processing. A change in the rating period is necessary.

RECOMMENDATION

Based upon extensive study, I recommend the following changes in the Non-Bargaining Unit Pay Plan.

Section 11.06 - Last paragraph should be changed to read as follows:

> All employees in Pay Plan I(A) shall be evaluated for a merit increase effective October 1. The evaluation shall cover the period from September 1 through August 31, preceding the October 1 effective date.

2. Section 11.09 - Change:

Parkways and Service Supt. Pay Grade

RECOMMENDATION (CONT'D)

3. Section 11.10 - Last paragraph should be changed to read as follows:

DATE: AUGUST 30, 1983

BACKGROUND

Bids were received and opened on August 23, 1983 for the establishment of an annual contract (or semi-annual contract) for chlorine. This chemical is used in both our Water Treatment and Wastewater Treatment plants.

This is a re-bid of the chlorine portion of the City's annual Water Treatment Chemicals bid (City Bid #83-31). The three (3) bids received at that time were rejected by City Council based on the fact that all were identical. At that time the City Attorney reported this fact to the Office of the State Attorney General as an instance of possible collusive bidding.

ANALYSIS

Bid invitations were forwarded to five (5) chlorine suppliers with four (4 responses being received. This bid was set-up to allow bidders to Bid prices for either a six month contract or a twelve month contract. After reviewing these proposals with William F. Savidge, Public Works Director, we are recommending that this bid be awarded as follows:

VENDOR:

Jones Chemicals, Inc. St. Petersburg, FL.

BID PRICES:

\$260.00 per ton \$39.00 per 150 lb. cylinder

TYPE OF CONTRACT: Annual

As can be noted on the attached bid tabulation sheet, with the exception of the six month bid submitted by Allied Universal Corporation, Miami, Florida, all bids received are again identical, although \$30.00 per ton higher than the bids rejected in July.

We feel that it is in the City's best interests to enter into an annual contract rather than a semi-annual contract in order to guarantee prices for a longer period of time. Industry sources predict a continued increase in costs of chlorine over the next 6 month at least. The price rise for chlorine over the last 13 months is illustrated below:

July, 1982 (Bid #82-30) - \$128.60/Ton July, 1983 (Bid #83-31) - 230.00/Ton August, 1983 (Bid #83-38) - \$260.00/Ton October, 1983 (predicted) - \$285.00/Ton

We are recommending Jones Chemicals, Inc. as the best bidder for this item because of a superior past history of service and cooperation with the City. McKesson Chemical Company supplied the City's chlorine requirements from August, 1982 thru August, 1983. During that period of time the City did experience several critical delays in deliveries.

We feel that the closer shipping point of Jones Chemical versus PB & S Chemicals gives an advantage to the recommended supplier. Jones Chemical ships direct from St. Petersburg. All orders for PB & S Chemicals originate from Orlando and are then off-loaded at St. Petersburg for shipment to Naples. This could allow for possible delays in deliveries.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the above information, I am respectfully requesting to issue a purchase order to Jones Chemicals, Inc., St. Petersburg, Florida to supply The City's annual requirements for chlorine.

We may expect to expend \$86,000.00 during the life of this contract. Funds for these purchases are budgeted in the Water/Sewer operational accounts.

BACKGROUND: In formulating our budget plan for the next fiscal year, we have reviewed the revenues derived from occupational licenses and are again recommending that the Council consider an ordinance that would effect an increase. The fees which are contained in our current ordinance were established in 1966 and were frozen by the state legislature in 1972. In 1981, the legislature bassed a law which allows municipalities to increase there occupational license fees.

ANALYSIS: The Florida Statutes define a "local occupational license" as a "method by which a local governing authority grants the privilege of engaging in or managing any business, profession, or occupation within its jurisdiction." It is a source of revenue by which the business community contributes to the cost of providing governmental services which allows the City to be an attractive place in which to do business. Because these funds were frozen in 1972, they have not kept pace with other sources of revenue which are also used to support the cost of government nor have they kept pace with the increases in cost to provide governmental services.

I have attached two exhibits from our 1982 audit report which compares revenues and expenditures for the years 1973-82. These are also the years during which occupational licenses fees were frozen. From the tables we see that the expenditures for the general government's functions increased from \$3-million a year in 1973 to \$7-million a year in 1982, and that other general forms of revenue that the City uses to pay these expenses have increased from \$2.9-million in 1973 to \$7.8-million in 1982. Our occupational license fees are contained in the "Fees and Licenses" category of revenue. Those revenues have only increased by \$45,000 during the ten-year period from \$216,000 in 1973 to \$261,000 in 1982. The main portion of this increase . came from the City's share of county occupational licenses which increased in 1981 when the County increased its occupational license fees.

One of the objections that we have heard in the past against increases in occupational license fees is that there has been no enforcement program within the City. The City actually has several enforcement program. In addition to the programs which Mayor and Council July 15, 1983 Page 2

have been in effect for several years such as comparing business lists with other organizations and reviewing newspapers and yellow pages advertising, the City has instituted one new enforcement program this past year. Through the cooperation of the Fire Department, the fire code inspectors who visit each business with the City once a year have been checking to verify that the business has a current occupational license. In eight months of this fiscal year, this program has resulted in 65 new licenses being issued totalling additional fees of \$3,360.

The fee increase that we are proposing amounts to 25% for each category described in the City's current ordinance. We have attached a sample of the ordinance annotated with the proposed and current fees so that you can identify the increase. We anticipate that this would generate \$20,000 in additional revenue during fiscal year 1982-83.) Based on the premise that the business community should continue to contribute its fair share toward the expenses of maintaining Naples as an attractive place to live and to do business, it follows that a reasonable increase in these occupational license fees is an equitable method of assuring this participation.


RECOMMENDATION: I recommend that the Council adopt on first reading the attached ordinance increasing occupational licenses by 25%.

We have notified the Chamber of Commerce and the Fifth Avenue South Merchants Association of this proposed ordinance and will meet with them and obtain their comments prior to the public hearing on second reading.

BACKGROUND: During discussions with representatives of the business community and with the Council in considering the increase in occupational license rates, we decided to change the section of the ordinance that provides for exemptions from licensing for coinoperated, vending and other machines. In additiona, it was determined to implement an administrative penalty for businesses which fail to obtain an occupational license.

ANALYSIS: The attached ordinance removes all exemptions from the provision governing coin-operated, vending or other machines, except for change machines, parcel-checking lockers and toilet locks used in depots, hotels and restaurants.

The second section of the ordinance provides for an administrative penalty of \$100. This penalty adds to our enforcement program without having to pursue the violation through the courts as a violation of the City code.

CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS: I recommend that the Council enact this ordinance as presented:



Flerida producted either-juice change machines, seep and bleach dispensers:

(2) Parcel-checking lockers and toilet locks used in depots, hotels and restaurants.

Each operator of machines described above shall furnish to the tax collector at the time of taking out a license. Therefor, a list showing the address or location where each licensed machine is to be located; the location may be changed without payment of additional license tax, provided that the tax collector is notified of such change and new location within three days of such change; if no such notification is given within three days, a transfer fee of two dollars (\$2,00) per machine shall be due and payable for each change.

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Sec. 12-49. When licenses sold, due and payable; expiration; penalties.

(a). Occupational licenses shall be sold beginning September 1st of each year, shall be due and payable on October 1st of each year, and shall expire on September 30th of the succeeding year. Those licenses not renewed by October 1st shall be considered delinquent and subject to a delinquency penalty of ten per cent (10%) for the month of October, plus an additional five per cent (5%) penalty for each month of delinquecy thereafter until paid; provided, that the total delinquency penalty shall not exceed twenty-five per cent (25%) of the occupational license fee for the delinquent establish-

(b) Any person engaging in or managing any business, occupation or profession without first obtaining a local occupation license, if required hereunder, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per cent (25%) of the license determined to be due, in addition to any other penalty provided by law or ordinance (Ord, No. 1778, § 1, 8-16-72)

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO OCCUPATIONAL LICENSES: AMENDING SECTION 12-47(45)(d), PERTAINING TO VENDING MACHINES, AND SECTION 12-49(b), PERTAINING TO PENALTIES FOR FAILURE TO OBTAIN AN OCCUPATIONAL LICENSE, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NAPLES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. PURPOSE: TO DELETE CERTAIN VENDING MACHINES AS EXEMPTIONS AND TO AMEND THE PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO OBTAIN AN OCCUPATIONAL LICENSE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPLES, FLORIDA:

- SECTION 1. That Section 12-47(45)(d) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Naples is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - (45) . COIN-OPERATED, VENDING OR OTHER MACHINES.
 - (d) Machines exempt from license:
 - (1) Change machines.
 - (2) Parcel-checking lockers and toilet locks used in depots, hotels and restaurants.
- SECTION 2. Section 12-49(b) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Naples is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - Sec. 12-49. When Licenses Sold, Due and Payable; Expiration; Penalties.
 - (b) Any person engaging in or managing any business, occupation or profession without first obtaining an occupational license, if required hereunder, shall be subject to a penalty of \$100.00 in addition to any other penalty provided by law or ordinance. This penalty shall not apply to any person who has obtained an occupational license for the previous year for the same business, occupation or profession and is merely late in the payment of the occupational license tax due hereunder. In such case, the penalties provided in paragraph (a) above shall apply.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption at second reading.

Piccadilly Pub Bought by Pate

Cloyd Pate has added the Piccadilly Pub, a Naples dining landmark and one of the area's oldest restaurants, to his chain of eating spots.

He said Shirley Smith, owner

He said Shirley Smith, owner since 1977, closed and sold him the Piccadilly Pub about two weeks ago. Pate will reopen what he calls the "downtown landmark" in about three weeks, after a complete renovation.

"WE DON'T plan to change the Pub's layout — just fix it all up again, the way it was years ago," Pate said today.

He said he hasn't decided on the fare, but is reviewing all the Piccadilly's Pub's old menus.

"I might not change the menu much. I've always thought the Piccadilly. Pub had good food," he added. Pate said he will replace all of the Pub's kitchen equipment.

THE RESTAURANT opened in 1961 at 625 Fifth Ave. S., in the heart of Naples' downtown business district. Steaks, hot browns, sandwiches, salads and seafood were offered for lunch. The dinner menu had more steaks and seafood, plus Italian dishes and other specialities.

"The Piccadilly Pub should stay right where it is. It's a downtown landmark, with plenty of parking and a good clientele. I want to take care of the old place," Pate said.

He owns four other restaurants, including Pate's, on the Naples Bay shore, next to the Cove line.

Pate just bought the former Pete and Danny's restaurant at 2096 U.S. 41 East, He now calls it Cassidy's, "a family steak house,"

Last year, Pate bought the former Jimmy's Reef, which is the present Christopher's, at 3126 U.S. 41 North.

Pate also owns Merriman's Wharf, a seafood restaurant in the Old Marine Market Place.
