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PRESENTATION OF BOAT TRAFFIC STUDY HENIGAR & RAY ENGINEERING ASSOCIATES, INC.

Mayor Putzell advised that Henigar Ray would in Engineering Associates, Inc., attendance to present the Boat Traffic Study. City Manager Jones noted that the Citizens' Ad Hoc Committee had reviewed the study and prepared a report outlining their recommendations. He then introduced Gail Easley who was responsible for the project.

Project Manager Gail Easley stated that Consultant Jane Gray was also in attendance to The purpose highlights and answer any questions. of the study was to observe boat traffic in Naples, Dollar, and Rookery Bays as well as Rock Creek, Gordon Pass, and the Gordon River. Specific issues were observed such as: the Bay's capacity, various boat traffic components, future boat traffic and traffic patterns, as well as future water-related activities.

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Ms. Gray confirmed for Mayor Putzell that the minimum water depth found in Naples Bay was two feet. Councilman Muenzer asked where the line had been drawn for north and south Naples. Ms. Gray advised that Page 47 delineated the channel boundaries and activity acreages for each segment based on survey results. On north Naples Bay, she said, 85% of the acreage was delineated for recreational boating, 15% for fishing activities,

Ms. Gray said the study indicated that 80% of boat trips were associated with the Naples Bay channel, 45% with Gordon Pass, and 45% with Gordon Bay. She said thus far 235 boats have been established during the peak hour which equates to approximately 3% of the total registered boats in Collier County. She explained that there would be limited use in buffered areas which would parallel the shore line. If level of service "B" is desired, the shore line must be expanded and ordinances adopted to enforce the system. In level of service "C", specified use areas would have to be established as well. She recommended coordination with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) in regard to activities at peak hours; a self-imposed quota in launching of boats as well as slowing down minimum wakes. Captain Allen Richard of the Department of Natural Resources, she said, has recommended that down zoning and speed limits not be used as it is difficult to enforce them. Decreasing the minimum wake zone appears to accomplish the kind of management technique needed for the type system.	Level pair ed nac code frow econo					
Referring to level of service "D", Ms. Easley stated that similar techniques apply; for instance, slowing down minimum wake at certain levels and times. She noted that elimination of a quota has been recommended for this level and suggested that local law enforcement agencies assist in extending that law. Increasing education, safety inspections, slowing down minimum wake zone at selected times are all recommended for level of service "E", she said. Ms. Easley recommended that management techniques be implemented as boat registrations would	dibjecs parad je stopo a pol					
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continue to increase and noted that compared to the State averages, Collier County has a high ratio of registered boats.

Councilman Muenzer asked the definition of a "bay". Dr. Staiger explained that a Bay was confined on most sides by land with a definite mouth opening. Councilman Muenzer stated that most bays have wide mouths which originate from a wide body of water not like Naples Bay which is a narrow channel with speed restrictions and operation limitations, he said.

Mayor Putzell asked if it would be feasible require everyone using the waterway to exhibit some certification as to vessel operation. Easley advised that could be accomplished adoption of an ordinance. Enactment of such ordinance would not affect the Intracoastal regulations, concluded. DNR's she Resources Manager Staiger advised the Florida legislature had adopted standard international and inland "rules of the road" in 1988. He further noted that the Police Department could enforce those regulations and cite violators for improper behavior. Mayor Putzell, however, stated he merely trying to establish that education learning techniques be studied prior to allowing amateurs the opportunity to navigate the Bay.

In response to Mayor Putzell, Dr. Staiger advised the report indicated that additional boat ramps and marinas were needed, however, environmental concerns relative to the same should also be seriously considered. He further advised that after the Naples Bay Watch Committee presents Council with its report, the Ad Hoc Committee would meet again to review those recommendations.

Mayor Putzell asked for clarification relative to the 12-month period recommended for Phase II. Dr. Staiger responded by advising that the Comprehensive Plan indicated costs for a one year boat traffic study at approximately \$50,000 to \$60,000. In response to Mayor Putzell, Ms. Easley said that she could not, at this time, estimate the costs to implement Phase II of the study.
