Mr. Scatena asked why this money could not be used to reduce the City of Naples residents' bills. City Manager Jones explained that the surcharge was imposed upon those users in the unincorporated area to make up for ad valorem taxes which City residents pay for the general operation in providing this service pursuant to State law.						
Mr. Scatena then asked about the City's recycling program and the current tipping fees paid to the County. City Manager Jones explained that when the recycling program was implemented the City had to bear the expenditures of equipment and workers. The program has since recovered the majority of those costs, he said. The County's tipping fees have remained constant because the cost of this recycling program has been so great. Mr. Jones further pointed out that the State would in the very near future mandate that local governments provide a means to reduce the amount of waste dumped at landfills.						
Regarding sidewalks on Fairway Terrace, Mr. Scatena once more requested that Council consider installing sidewalks in this area as requested by many of the residents in that neighborhood. City Manager Jones pointed out that a survey would be conducted in the very near future which would include a question about sidewalks and the need for the same.						
Mr. Bill Earles asked for clarification of his tax bill. City Manager Jones showed Mr. Earles the columns indicative of the proposed tax and existing tax.						
Councilman Crawford then reiterated the millage rate and said that there was a tax increase in the City. The majority of the budget, he continued, is earmarked for personnel services. If the budget amount was reduced, some of those services would also have to be reduced, he said.						
Mrs. Mifa VanArsdale reiterated a question asked earlier about why her property taxes increased by nearly 50%. Vice-Mayor Barnett explained once again that the City's portion of the tax bill amounted to less than 10% and further that the taxes are figured on the assessed value of property.
