Mr. Harry Timmins of 555 Kingstown Drive said that he fully supported a boat dock moratorium on Naples Bay. He believed that the traffic problems on the Bay warranted such action to provide for some future planning of that waterway. Mr. J. 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| moratorium. He recommended the moratorium remain in place at least until Phase II of the Naples Bay Study could be completed. | | | | | | |
| Captain Allan Slaff of 3101 Green Dolphin Lane advised that he was also in favor of the boat dock moratorium. He noted that the recently completed study of the Bay indicated that it was at a level of service "C" which was considered a potentially dangerous situation. | | | | | | |
| Captain Allen Walburn of 880 12th Avenue South advised that he was the Chairman of the Citizens Ad Hoc Advisory Committee on Naples Bay, and his group believed there were other controls which could be implemented to help the current situation. While he personally had no position on a moratorium, Captain Walburn noted that the Committee had discussed it and believed such action unnecessary. He then addressed the level of service assigned to Naples Bay by Henigar & Ray Consultants and said that he believed the cited level of service "C" to be a worst case scenario. Most of the time, he continued, the Bay operates at level of service "A" or "B". | | | | | • | |
| Mr. Duke Turner of 899 10th Street South, owner of Turner Marina, said that he was not in favor of a moratorium inasmuch as the waterfront property owners have formed an Association to develop appropriate zoning regulations for the area. If a moratorium was imposed, he said, there would not be a need for a Waterfront District. | | | | | | |
| Dr. Fran Stallings, representing the Conservancy, Environmental Protection Division, advised that his group was in favor of a moratorium as it believed the water quality of the Bay has deteriorated from not only boat activities, but stormwater runoff and Gordon River flow. | | | | | | |
| Attorney Robert E. Doyle, Jr., representing Collier Enterprises, said that he did not believe an emergency situation existed on the Bay which would warrant a moratorium. The moratorium, he continued, would only affect commercial application and would not have any effect upon traffic in the Bay caused by residential or public | | | | | | |
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| | use. There are many other controls which can be implemented in the Bay to reduce the amount of traffic hazards, Attorney Doyle said. | • | | | | | |
| | Mrs. Edith Williams of 3300 Gin Lane urged Council to support a temporary moratorium so that the safety of Naples Bay could be determined through Phase II of the Naples Bay Study. | | | | | | |
| | Mr. Philip C. Morse, Jr., owner of Boat Haven, said that he did not support a moratorium as he did not believe that boats or boat docks were the problem. He cited water quality as one condition and noted that Brookside Marina has raw sewage leaking from their septic tanks into the Bay. The same is true for Haldeman Creek, Mr. Morse said. | - | | | | • | |
| | Mr. Falconer Jones of 1100 Sixth Avenue South, advised that he was the Chairman of the newly formed Waterfront District Association. Mr. Jones noted that his group has hired consultant/planners to come up with a plan that would address the use of property adjacent to Naples Bay. He asked for Council's support in denying this moratorium to allow his group the opportunity to come up with some solutions. | | | | | | |
| | Mrs. Anderson-McDonald said that she supported the idea of a ten or twenty year planning program. She asked Mr. Jones if he thought a moratorium would help his group with their study. While Mr. Jones said he could not answer for the Association, he personally believed a moratorium would not solve the problems currently existing on the Bay and waterfront. | | | | | | |
| | Councilman Crawford asked when the Association would be ready to begin its study. Mr. Falconer Jones noted that the proposals were due back in two to three weeks at which time the selection process would begin. He further advised that the consultant may need some help from the City in obtaining data. | | | | | | |
| | In response to Mayor Putzell, Mr. Falconer Jones estimated the study to take approximately nine months once a consultant has been selected. | | | | | | |
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| Councilman Richardson asked if Henigar & Ray had provided the City with an estimate for Phase II of the Naples Bay Study. Natural Resources Manager Staiger advised that they had not, but estimated such a study to cost between \$75,000 and \$80,000 and take approximately 12 months to complete. The Mayor then asked each member of Council to comment briefly on the issue of a boat dock moratorium. Referring to safety on Naples Bay, Councilman Muenzer said he believed there was a definite problem especially on the weekends. He continued that as long as he perceived such a problem, he would support a moratorium to provide an opportunity for the implementation of Phase II of the Naples Bay Study. Mr. Muenzer further asked staff to coordinate with the County to determine what ramps and boat docks they have planned to construct, and determine whether or not the County government would be willing to support this issue. Councilman Crawford said that while he did not | | | | | | |
| like to override a Citizen's Advisory Committee's recommendations, he has consistently supported this moratorium and would continue to do so. Additionally, he suggested the scope of work for Phase II of the study be reduced and address only boating traffic to keep the costs of that study in check. | | | | | | |
| In response to Mr. Richardson, Mayor Putzell advised that he has had numerous conversations with County officials asking for their support in this matter. Councilman Richardson said that he believed a joint effort was necessary in addressing the problems on Naples Bay, but he did not believe a moratorium was necessary at this time. Mr. Barnett concurred. | | | | | | |
| Councilman Anderson-McDonald said that she has consistently supported a temporary moratorium, but after the discussion with Mr. Falconer Jones at these proceedings, believed the Association should have an opportunity to come up with a plan with the help of staff and Council. A moratorium, she | | | | | | |
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| continued, will not address the number of accidents, number of boats, or safety on the Bay; those will continue to be evident. Mrs. Anderson-McDonald further said that she believed a finite time limit, such as six months, should be imposed on the moratorium if it was approved. Councilman Graver also supported a time limit on the moratorium and said that he did not believe the number of commercial docks proposed by developers during the next 12 months to be detrimental to the operation of Naples Bay. If the County does not cooperate, he said, this moratorium would penalize only the citizens of Naples by restricting their use of waterfront property. Mayor Putzell said that he believed the boat safety on Naples Bay had a direct relationship with a moratorium. He referred to the Sabal Bay hearings wherein Council unanimously denied a 800 slip marina on the basis of boat safety in Naples Bay. This moratorium, he continued, would allow the City and the Waterfront District Association the time needed to complete their studies and | | | | | |
| prepare a master plan for Naples Bay and the adjacent waterfront properties. Mrs. Anderson-McDonald pointed out that she did not mention boat safety in her vote to deny Sabal Bay. | | | | | |
| Discussion then ensued relative to the amount of commercial boat dock slips proposed for development in the City. In response to Councilman Barnett, Dr. Staiger advised that no more than 100 slips would be permitted within the next 12 months. Mr. Richardson pointed out that the permitting process for any application through the Department of Environmental Regulation (DER), the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), and the City would take almost a year to complete, therefore, a moratorium of sorts was already imposed. | | | | | |
