The Public Art Advisory Committee was formed to advise the City Council on matters dealing with the dollar for art program as well as to develop for City Council approval guidelines, policies, and procedures for the acquisition of public artwork in the city either through loan, donation, or purchase. The committee also assist the City Council by receiving public input, providing technical advice, and making recommendations for the matters within the committee's jurisdiction and duties.

During the September 18th City Council Special Meeting it was determined to dissolve the Public Art Advisory Committee (PAAC) and shift the responsible tasks to the Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAB). Currently public art items that are required for new development must go to the Design Review Board (DRB) prior to coming to the PAAC, and items in parks and open spaces must go to the CSAB. Due to the lack of attendance of board members and the consistent vacancies on the PAAC it was determined the best direction was to eliminate the PAAC to provide stability and efficiency.

The next action is to amend the ordinances for the PAAC, Public Art, DRB, and CSAB to reflect the new direction and reassign tasks. Moving forward the CSAB will assume the responsibilities of the PAAC, and the DRB will continue to initiate public art from the private development side. The public art fund will continue and be managed by the CSAB. The PAAC will be dissolved.

On October 4, 2023, the City Council approved the 1st Reading with emphasis that the DRB will handle approving private development related art through their process. Once approved at the DRB level it will then go to City Council for final

approval. The CSAB will administer public art in parks and open spaces. The public art fund will be managed by the CSAB if a developer selects to donate into that fund instead of putting in artwork during development. The goal is to prevent overlap and become more efficient with the process.
